Finally, a place to call home

Lebanon Area Foundation, donors, Shadel family help Free Store get its own building

Thanks to help from multiple donors and the Lebanon Area Foundation, the Free Store Ministry will soon have a new, larger home.

On Wednesday morning, members of the Free Store's board, as well as LAF members and the Shadel family met at the former Shadel's Colonial Chapel on Elm Street to announce that the building, which

Shadel's moved out of in 2009, would soon become the new Lebanon Free Store.

"We're really overwhelmed and extremely excited to be able to see what is going to be able to be done for the community through this donation," said Free Store Ministry Director Amber Meredith.

The Free Store Ministry, which was founded in 1999, is currently located in a smaller building on Commercial Street. Along with pro-

viding free clothing and other items to people in need, Free Store Ministry also hosts several events throughout the year, giving out items needed for Thanksgiving dinner, the first day of school and Christmas toys.

Meredith recently approached LAF about getting help with moving out of the organization's current cramped location. Board member Tom O'Neil said it didn't take long to get the backing the Free Store needed to purchase the Shadel property.

"We were very fortunate. When my committee went to people and asked for help, they helped," O'Neil said. Also on the committee were Bob Fields, Kelly Rhoades, Debbie Moore and Annette Darnell.

"It all fell together quickly. It's easy to help the Free Store because people in this community know what Amber Meredith and her family have put into this, and it's great to try to help people like that," O'Neil said.

It didn't take very long for the Free

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Store Ministry to collect the money to purchase the building. Two large donations from anonymous donors were followed by several smaller donations and \$67,000 from LAF's Legacy Fund, which is set aside for brick-and-mortar grants for organizations. The Free Store Ministry even

Couple charged with duo of felony counts

Samantha Wall, Jeffrey Wall held for drugs, child endangerment

A Lebanon couple have each been charged with two felonies after police found marijuana and meth in their Parkhurst Drive home.

Samantha May Lee Fay Wall, 34, and Jeffrey Dale Wall, 39, each face a class C felony of possession of a controlled substance and a class C felony of endangering the welfare of a child. Both remain in the Laclede County Jail in lieu of \$25,000 cash or surety bonds.

According to a report from the Lebanon Police Department and probable cause statements from the Laclede County Prosecuting Attorney, an officer was called to assist a Department of Social Services worker in the investigation of drug activ-

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ity at the by the couple after a child who lives in the home made comments about drugs being inside the house.

The reports state that an officer and the state worker made contact with the Walls late Tuesday morning and advised them of the allegations.

The couple allegedly denied the allegations and gave permis-

sion for the officer to search their home.

In a bedroom closet, the officer discovered a black pouch with two glass pipes with residue that field tested positive for methamphetamine,

Take a kid fishing

BSSP to hold annual kids' day on May 3

Every May, Bennett Spring State Park dedicates a day to inspiring a new generation of fishermen and teaching children about the outdoors.

This year, the park will hold its annual Kids' Fishing Day on May 3 during normal fishing hours, which are 6:30 a.m. to 8:15 p.m. On that day, kids age 15 and younger will receive free fishing tags and goodie bags, and the lower part of Zone 2 and the beginning of Zone 3, or from the

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hatchery outlet to the last set of concrete steps in Zone 3, will especially stocked in anticipation of the 1,000 to 1,200 minors who are expected to participate in the event.

According to Bennett Spring Hatchery Manager Mike Mitchell, that means that park staff will stock the area with 4,000 fish, plus about 25

Kidnapping suspect to go to trial in May

Patricia Daniels stands accused of taking 4-year-old child from yard in 2011

More than two years after an alleged kidnapping, a Lebanon woman may finally face a jury next month.

During a pre-trial conference held Monday, which was one of many court appearances since 47-year-old Patricia Daniels was accused of kidnapping a child in August 2011, the defendant's counsel, Christine Hutson, informed the court that the case is ready

to proceed to trial. Twenty-sixth Circuit Court Judge Stan Moore has set Daniel's jury trial to start May 28 in Laclede County Court, according to online records.

Daniels faces a class A felony for allegedly kidnapping a 4-year-old girl and taking her to Walmart.

Ronald Wright, 60, of Lebanon, who was driving the vehicle that transported the girl from her home on Amy Drive

to the store, pleaded guilty to a lesser charge in October 2012. He was sentenced to a two years of supervised probation. Prosecuting Attorney Jon Morris has said that his office felt Wright was "less culpable" in the crime. Wright had told officers at the time of his arrest that he thought picking up the girl was "strange," but he didn't ask Daniels any questions.

According to a probable

cause statement released at the time, the girl was taken on Aug. 13, 2011, from a yard in the 1600 block of Amy Drive. The child's mother called the Lebanon Police Department to report the kidnapping.

While speaking with officers, a man and woman, who had been in the Wright's vehicle, approached the scene and told officers that Wright

Baseball team wins again, improves to 6-2

Senior Austin Knight holds Parkview to one run as Yellowjackets defeat Vikings

SPRINGFIELD—The Lebanon baseball team won its second straight Ozark Conference game on Tuesday, defeating the Parkview Vikings in Springfield, 9-5.

Lebanon senior right hander Austin Knight got the start on the mound and went the first six innings to record his third win in three starts. He allowed just one run on two hits, walked five and struck out 11 in the win.

In the sixth, the Vikings reached on a dropped third

strike and a pair of infield errors, but Knight struck out four in the frame to end the threat.

Lebanon (6-2 overall, 2-0 Ozark Conference) trailed Parkview 1-0 after two innings but tied the game with a run in the third, added two more in the fourth and a single run in the fifth to take a 4-1 lead.

Senior Johnson led off the third inning with a triple and came home on an RBI ground out by Rocky Long.

It was the first at-bat of the season for Johnson, who has been a fixture in the outfield defensively and a key pitcher.

LHS added two more runs in the fourth as Keaton Warren and Nick Percy each singled and scored on a two-run hit by first baseman Matt Cornelison.

Then Long led off the fifth by hitting Lebanon's first home run of the season, giving the 'Jackets a 4-1 lead.

Lebanon broke the game open in the top of the seventh, scoring five runs.

Austin Knight reached on a double with one out, and LHS eventually sent 10 batters to the plate in the inning. Warren delivered a two-run hit and Matt Cornelison added a two-run double in

the frame.

Cornelison finished 2 for 4 with four RBIs.

Parkview (1-9 overall, 0-2 Ozark Conference) scored four runs in the bottom of the seventh against Lebanon relief pitchers.

Lebanon will host Warsaw on Thursday. The Wildcats are 10-2 this spring.

Despite the win, Lebanon head coach Dustin Young said the team isn't satisfied.

"Today, I didn't feel like our intensity was what it had been earlier in the season," Young said. "I think our kids under-

stand that, they were actually the ones that identified it. We are going to try to get back to that and use Thursday as a positive step forward.

"You can't be content, and there isn't a team that is content until they are the one holding the trophy at the end of the year. We are constantly looking to improve and find things that we've got to do to get better."

Tennis team still waiting to get on the court this season

After suffering several rainouts, LHS will host tournament today without key seniors

Spring sports has been underway for nearly a month, but the Lebanon boys' tennis team still has just one match under its belt, an 8-1 loss on March 31 at Waynesville.

On Tuesday, Lebanon and Camdenton began a match at Lebanon High School, but the match was halted due to inclement weather. The two teams had just wrapped up doubles play and were about to begin singles play with rain began.

Lebanon head coach Ron Crowell said the 'Jackets are set to get plenty of action today when LHS hosts the Central Bank Tournament. Parkview, Willow Springs and Bolivar will be in town, and doubles matches will begin at LHS and at Boswell Park at 8:30 a.m.

"I think the biggest struggle has been that it has been hard to get in the flow and get in any kind of rhythm," Crowell said. "We played Waynesville, and it seems like a month ago. It hasn't really been that long, but you try to make adjustments after that first match and you're ready to play, then you have rainouts and it is hard to

gauge if you've improved or not because it's been so long between matches."

Crowell said with a young team coming in this season, getting court time is important to evaluate play.

"It has been hard with a young team to make adjustments," Crowell said. "You want to play a match to see if you're progressing at all, and you're not getting that opportunity because of the weather.

"We have made the most of it and have taken advantage of the practice time and that has been good for us. We saw some improvement last night against Camdenton since Waynesville but didn't get to finish the match."

LHS lost all three doubles matches to the Lakers, but Crowell said there were signs of progress. Chad Howerton and Bennett Brown hung tough with a tough No. 1 Camdenton doubles team, and Doug Uder and Dalton Beard were solid at No. 2 doubles.

"Howerton and Brown played really well and Camdenton has a freshman that is unreal, and they are a really good doubles team," Crowell said. "But they had

some good points and I was really encouraged with the way they played."

Crowell said Uder and Beard were competing together for the first time this season as several seniors are gone this week for the American Heritage Trip. Their absence will give underclassmen Uder, Justin Beck and Richard Phan an opportunity to play varsity and gain valuable experience.

"It is a good opportunity, these kids are going to be here next year and will fill

in for those seniors next year," Crowell said. "They are going to get a good taste for it, whether the results are good or bad, we are going to get a gauge on what their strengths and weaknesses are against varsity competition.

"That is only going to make them better, and that experience will make them better. Hopefully they'll gain some confidence and understand what they need to work on to be successful next season when they are up on the varsity."

Once upon a time, no one ever discussed the benefits of taking a child fishing. No one needed to be- cause everyone was doing it.

However, that's not the world we live in anymore. In today's fast-paced culture, life is a schedule jammed with commitments and "family time" consists of conversations held on drives to and from ball practice, school activities or birthday parties. In this rush-rush scenario, an adult's good intentions to take their children (or someone else's children) fishing often remains in dry dock.

That's too bad because, although the world of family life is ever-changing, the benefits of getting kids involved in fishing haven't changed. Fishing is still a good way to connect children with the outdoors, it's

still a good way introduce them to a healthier off-the-couch lifestyle, and it's still a good way to create or strengthen family bonds.

These benefits are reasons the Missouri Department of Conservation is interested in getting people involved in its free Discover Nature Fishing Program. This statewide program provides a series of lessons to help kids and families gain skills and confidence to go fishing. A series of classes are going to be held over the summer at select sites near Springfield, Joplin and Stockton. These classes are for youth ages 7 to 15 who are accompanied by an adult, or people can register as entire families.

The good news is that national data shows there have been increases in youth participation in fishing in recent years. However, all of the activities for youths and adults that compete for fishing time are still very much part of our culture, too, so getting children and families interested in fishing will always have its share of challenges.

These classes are designed to cover all aspects of basic fishing and are divided into four two-hour sessions. The first session will be on equipment, casting and proper fish handling. The second will be on how to rig a pole and bait a hook. The third will be on aquatic biology, ecology and conservation. The fourth lesson will be on how and when to use various types of lures.

In order to make this effort a success, the Department of Conservation is looking for volunteers who can help teach these classes. To be an instructor, volunteers must first attend a volunteer instructor class. At these classes, volunteer instructors will learn how the courses will be structured and what topics that will be covered. These volunteer instructor classes will also cover first-aid situations, group management techniques and other things that will come in handy when teaching classes.

The Discover Nature Fishing Program is another example of

Recreational hog hunting popularity soaring

Some argue the surge came as a response to farmland and other property becoming overrun with the wild swine

NATCHEZ, Miss. — A quick tap on the roof of the electric hunting cart and the pop of two rifle shots and Jody Greene and Jeff Goeggle have taken down their first hog of the night.

It's one of hundreds they will kill this year; they bagged 420 last year.

Goeggle's tap on the roof of the cart signals he has spotted a hog, and he and Greene both shoot to ensure one of them hits the animal. It's a routine they'll repeat during approximately 200 hunts in 2014.

You might call them hog wild, but they are just two of many local hunters who are part of a national trend of recreational hog hunting that's popularity has soared in recent years.

Goeggle and Greene, who run Double G Hog Control in Monterey with Greene's wife, Tracy, have hunted hogs together for nearly three years for farmers and landowners who have problems with wild hogs rooting up their property.

While they are happy to be of service to those whose land or crops are overrun by hogs, Goeggle and Greene enjoy hog hunting and don't charge for their services. The hunters generally stop at gas stations or other places after hunts and give away the hogs.

The network of farmers and friends they've created provides

them with 150,000 acres in Mississippi and Louisiana to hunt anytime they want.

"It's fun to do, and it's challenging," Greene said. "It's something I can do with my family and friends, and it's pretty exciting out there at night."

Greene

and Goeggle hunt during the day and also at night using night-vision goggles and thermal scopes.

"The thermals pick up heat, and there's no way they can hide from them," Greene said.

Goeggle and Greene have developed a system involving teamwork to effectively hunt hogs at night.

Goeggle rides on the back of a Polaris hunting cart scanning the horizon through his thermal scope before moving his eyes to the farmland, looking for signs of rooting or a bright white spot, indicating heat from an animal.

When he spots something, Goeggle taps on the roof of

the cart and gives Greene — who's wearing the night-vision goggles — directions to the animal.

Sometimes it's an armadillo, a deer, maybe even a bear. But if it is a hog or a group of hogs, called a sounder, Goeggle and Greene determine who takes the first shot, and then a second shot from the other hunter follows to ensure a kill.

Goeggle and Greene don't want to give away all their secrets, but they say it takes perseverance and perfected techniques to hunt hogs.

Hogs are highly intelligent and thrive in a variety of climates and conditions, which Greene and Goeggle say means they can be run off one spot only to pop up in another.

The surge in popularity of wild hog hunting locally follows a national trend of hunting hogs recreationally.

Some would argue the increased popularity of hog hunting came as a response to farmland and other property

or 30 lunkers. Although adults are allowed to fish in other areas of the park that day and can help kids fish, adults will not be allowed to do any fishing of their own in the kids' zone.

Besides fishing, kids who show up at Bennett Spring on May 3 will be able to enjoy a variety of educational events and activities, most of which will be located around Shelter House B. Among these are fly-tying, a touch tank, and a fish cleaning and cooking demonstration. Additionally, the World Bird Sanctuary will again bring exotic and Missouri raptors for children to see. Mitchell said that these events generally take place from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Kids younger than 15 will also be privy to a free lunch.

"This is really an outreach-type event to try to get kids interested in fishing again," Mitchell explained. "There's lots of activities: soccer, basketball, band -- and this is just one of the efforts that the Missouri Department of Conservation in conjunction with the Department of Natural Resources, we make to introduce kids to fishing or to instill in them a love for fishing. So by holding the event like this where they get to come and fish, and there's some other activities where they can learn about the outdoors, it's just a good way to introduce the outdoors to them, and hopefully they'll enjoy fishing as well."

While kids will be well provided for, Mitchell reminds parents, guardians and other chaperones that they will have to take care of their own needs while accompanying minors at the park.

"For adults who do bring your kids down, everything is free for kids who are 15 and under, so that means anybody who is older than that, including adults, will have to make sure that they bring money for a lunch to buy at the concessionaire, or pack a lunch for themselves, because it's hard for us to be able to generate an event that would be able to feed that many people. So just be aware of that," Mitchell said.

In the end, Mitchell said, Kids' Fishing Day is a good way to spend time with family and teach children about nature.

"It's always a good time, especially for families and people who have young children, to spend time with them," he said. "We're providing you a good opportunity to spend time with your kids and also teach them about the natural world in general. I think it's just a good opportunity in general for people to come down. We provide a good fishery here. It's close to Lebanon, it's close to Camden-ton, lots of good places. It's just a good opportunity for people to come and see the park."

Growing up in the Guard

Missouri Guard legacies make service, sacrifice a family tradition

— When Dustin Frederick was 3 years old, his father, Col. Lance Myler, came home from drill and hung his oath of office on the wall, signed by Charles M. Keifner, the former adjutant general of the Missouri National Guard.

Twenty-seven years later, Frederick's father promoted him to staff sergeant at Ike Skelton Training Site.

"As a Guardsman myself, watching Dustin take the next step for a non-commissioned officer is a proud day for me and the rest of our family as well," Myler said.

Myler enlisted into active service as an Army military policeman in 1983. He commissioned into the Missouri National Guard as an aviation officer in 1987 through Reserve Officer Training Corps and now serves in the Individual Ready Reserve from his hometown of Lebanon.

"My dad's service really inspired me growing up," Frederick said. "I always wanted to join the Guard. He went on his first deployment when I was 20, and three years later I enlisted."

Frederick is not the only member of his family continuing the Guard legacy. His sister-in-law, Pvt. Sam Hooper, is slated leave for Basic Combat Training this summer, and his younger brother, Brandon Myler, is currently in the enlistment process.

Since Frederick's enlistment he has held four military occupational specialties, including information technology, maintenance, admin, and now medical

logistics with the Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 229th Multifunctional Medical Battalion in Jefferson City.

Sgt. 1st Class Daniel Hopkins, the 229th's Readiness noncommissioned officer, said this is Frederick's second promotion since he joined the unit.

"Frederick came to me as a specialist three years ago and really hit the ground running," Hopkins said. "I'm sure he'll be looking for many new opportunities to grow and succeed in the future in the Guard."

To Frederick and Myler, work doesn't feel like work when family is around. Myler gave his son's unit incentive rides in his Black Hawk during Frederick's 2011 and 2012 annual training.

"It was a great time to get to meet his unit and his leadership and kind of see what the Guard world looks like to him,"

Myler said. "It's exciting to see our legacy as a family become part of the Guard legacy. I mean, all you have to do is step in the front door of ISTS and you'll see photos and exhibits that show what we're a part of."

Frederick's battalion commander, Lt. Col. Rebecca Segovia arranged for his father to promote him, like her father promoted her at every ceremony from staff sergeant to lieutenant colonel.

"I remember my father wore his Korean War veterans hat to the ceremony with all of his ribbons," Segovia said. "He pinned my rank on and saluted me with a tear in his eye. It was also my deployment ceremony to Kosovo."

Six months into Segovia's deployment, her father passed away.

Like Frederick, Segovia's family also carries on a legacy of military service. Her father, his five brothers,

and six of her mother's siblings all served in different branches of the military. Segovia passed the tradition on to her son, niece, and nephew who all serve in the National Guard with her.

Segovia, Frederick, and Myler cherish the opportunities they get to work with their families, and the occasions they celebrate much more. Like Myler, she makes time to mark her family's military milestones. She plans to attend her niece's upcoming basic combat training graduation.

"As military legacies, we have grown up with values that mirror the Army values," Segovia said. "When you really live and understand sacrifice firsthand, your reality changes, and you treasure the moments you have."

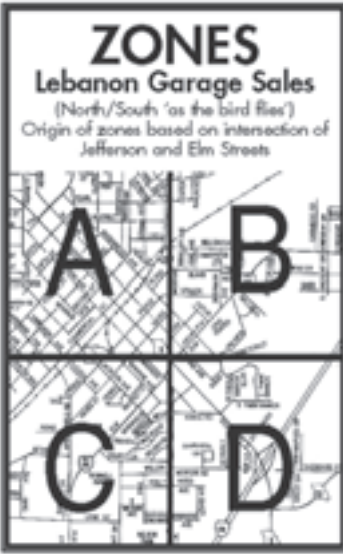

I like a few of the people I work with, but I don't know if I can invite only them. What do I do?

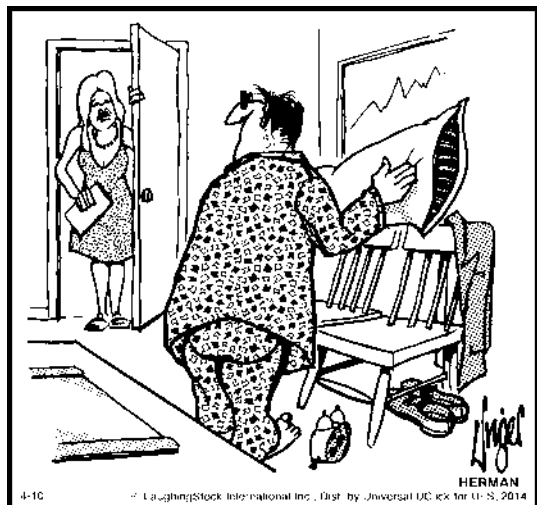

‘Oh, that is just my weed, man’

A 28-year-old Lebanon man allegedly told a Lebanon Police officer Tuesday night that it was perfectly legal for him to have marijuana, but said he had been lied to when the officer informed him the substance was in fact illegal. According to a report from the LPD, an officer was called to the 1600 block of Timbercreek Road at about 10 p.m. Tuesday to investigate the report of a suspicious person trespassing. An officer located a man, identified as the 28-year-old, walking in a nearby field that was posted with no trespassing signs. When the officer made contact with the man, the report states that there was a plastic baggie hanging out of the man’s pocket. When the officer asked what was in his pocket, the man allegedly said, “Oh, that is just my weed, man” and told the officer it was legal for him to have the substance. The officer then seized the baggie, which allegedly contained a green leafy substance. After the officer placed the man into custody, the suspect was advised that marijuana was not legal in the state of Missouri. The man then allegedly stated, “They lied to me.” When the officer asked who had lied, the man responded, “The United States did.” The man was issued summonses for Lebanon Municipal Court for possession of marijuana and trespassing in the first degree with a court date of May 15 and released.

kicked in several thousands of dollars that had been donated to the organization last year. The Shadel family even stepped in with an in-kind donation to make up the difference in the purchase price for the building that had been listed at \$295,000. “Our family has been here for years, and the community has been awful good to us. electronic scales and a pocket mirror with a white residue, numerous empty plastic baggies, several plastic baggies with a white substance that field tested positive for methamphetamine, as well as other drug paraphernalia items. As the officer was arresting the Walls, they both allegedly stated that the items located belonged to a friend who they allowed to move some items to their residence. The friend has been arrested recently and was still incarcerated. A second officer responded

to the residence to aid in the search, and more illegal items were confiscated. According to the report, officers found marijuana bongs, knives, a hypodermic needle and several other items. Two different prescription medications, Clonazepam (an anti-anxiety, muscle relaxant) and Amitriptyline (an antidepressant), were also located. Jeffrey Wall allegedly admitted that the marijuana-related items belonged to him but denied owning any of the items connected to meth,

stating that “they do not do that drug.” The baggies of the white powdery substance, the Clonazepam pills and one of the “bowls” from the bongs were submitted to the Missouri State Highway Patrol Laboratory for positive identification and for an exact weight. Daniels and Daniels were at Walmart with the child. They claimed Daniels had said the girl’s mother gave her permission to take the child to the store to get a toy. Witnesses at Walmart told

the police that Daniels, who they said appeared intoxicated, walked up to them and said she was adopting the child. They also reported that the child was crying.

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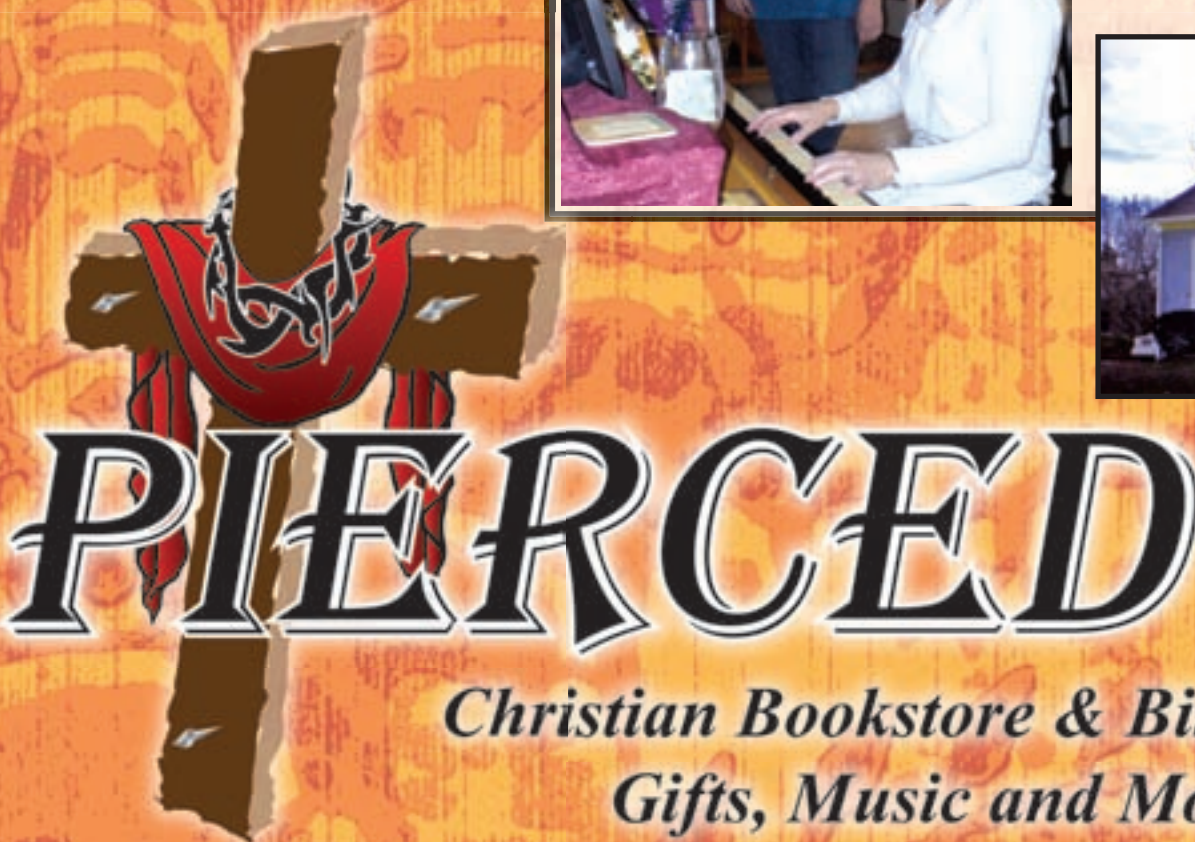

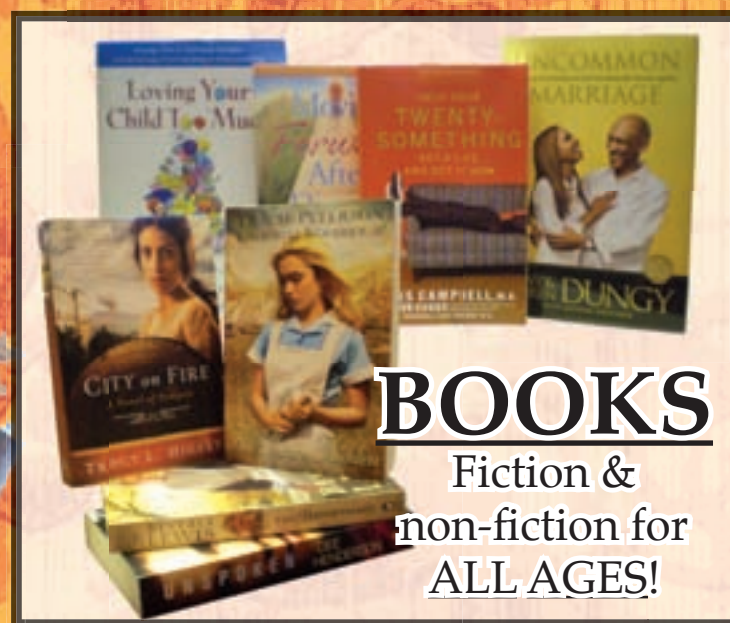


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
