Lebanon Area Foundation, donors, Shadel family help Free Store get its own building

Thanks to help from multiple donors and the Lebanon Area Foundation, the Free Store Ministry will soon have a new, larger home.

On Wednesday morning, members of the Free Store's board, as well as LAF members and the Shadel family met at the former Shadel's Colonial Chapel on Elm Street to announce that the building, which

soon become the new Lebanon Free Store.

"We're really overwhelmed and extremely excited to be able to see what is going to be able to be done for the community through this donation," said Free Store Ministry Director Amber Meredith.

The Free Store Ministry, which was founded in 1999, is currently located in a smaller building on Commercial Street. Along with pro-

Shadel's moved out of in 2009, would viding free clothing and other items to people in need, Free Store Ministry also hosts several events throughout the year, giving out items needed for Thanksgiving dinner, the first day of school and Christmas toys.

Meredith recently approached LAF about getting help with moving out of the organization's current cramped location. Board member Tom O'Neil said it didn't take long to get the backing the Free Store needed to purchase the Shadel property.

"We were very fortunate. When my committee went to people and asked for help, they helped," O'Neil said. Also on the committee were Bob Fields, Kelly Rhoades, Debbie Moore and Annette Darnell.

"It all fell together quickly. It's easy to help the Free Store because people in this community know what Amber Meredith and her family have put into this, and it's great to try to help people like that," O'Neil said. It didn't take very long for the Free

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Store Ministry to collect the money to purchase the building. Two large donations from anonymous donors were followed by several smaller donations and \$67,000 from LAF's Legacy Fund, which is set aside for brick-and-mortar grants for organizations. Kidnapping suspect to go to trial in May

Patricia Daniels stands accused of taking 4-year-old child from yard in 2011

During a pre-trial conference held Monday, which was one of many court appearances since 47-year-old Patricia Daniels was accused of kidnapping a child in August 2011, the defendant's counsel, Christine Hutson, informed

Take a kid fishing BSSP to hold annual kids' day on May 3

Every May, Bennett Spring State Park dedicates a day to inspiring a new generation of fishermen and teaching children about the outdoors.

This year, the park will hold its annual Kids' Fishing Day on May 3 during normal fishing hours, which are 6:30 a.m. to 8:15 p.m. On that day, kids age 15 and younger will receive free fishing tags and goodie bags, and the lower part of Zone 2 and the beginning of Zone 3, or from the

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hatchery outlet to the last set of concrete steps in Zone 3, will especially stocked in anticipation of the 1,000 to 1,200 minors who are expected to participate in the event.

According to Bennett Spring Hatchery Manager Mike Mitchell, that means that park staff will stock the area with 4,000 fish, plus about 25





Baseball team wins again, improves to 6-2 Senior Austin Knight holds Parkview to one run as Yellowjackets defeat Vikings

non baseball team won its second straight Ozark Conference game on Tuesday, defeating the Parkview Vikings in Springfield, 9-5.

Lebanon senior right hander Austin Knight got the start on the mound and went the first six innings to record his third win in three starts. He allowed just one run on two hits, walked five and struck out 11 in the win.

In the sixth, the Vikings reached on a dropped third strike and a pair of infield errors, but Knight struck out four in the frame to end the threat.

Lebanon (6-2 overall, 2-0 Ozark Conference) trailed Parkview 1-0 after two innings but tied the game with a run in the third, added two more in the fourth and a single run in the fifth to take a 4-1 lead.

Senior Johnson led off the third inning with a triple and came home on an RBI ground out by Rocky Long.

It was the first at-bat of the season for Johnson, who has been a fixture in the outfield defensively and a key pitcher.

LHS added two more runs in the fourth as Keaton Warren and Nick Pearcy each singled and scored on a two-run hit by first baseman Matt Cornelison.

Then Long led off the fifth by hitting Lebanon's first home run of the season, giving the 'Jackets a 4-1 lead.

Lebanon broke the game open in the top of the seventh, scoring five runs. Austin Knight reached on a double with one out, and LHS eventually sent 10 batters to the plate in the inning. Warren delivered a two-run hit and Matt Cornelison added a two-run double in the frame.

Cornelison finished 2 for 4 with four RBIs. Parkview (1-9 overall, 0-2 Ozark Conference) scored four runs in the bottom of the seventh against Lebanon relief pitchers.

Lebanon will host Warsaw on Thursday. The Wildcats are 10-2 this spring. Despite the win, Lebanon

head coach Dustin Young said the team isn't satisfied.

"Today, I didn't feel like our intensity was what it had been earlier in the season," Young said. "I think our kids under-

stand that, they were actually the ones that identified it. We are going to try to get back to that and use Thursday as a positive step forward.

"You can't be content, and there isn't a team that is content until they are the one holding the trophy at the end of the year. We are constantly looking to improve and find things that we've got to do to get better."

some good points and I was really encouraged with the way they played."





LOCAL Growing up in the Guard

Missouri Guard legacies make service, sacrifice a family tradition

From Missouri National Guard **IEFFERSON CITY**

— When Dustin Frederick was 3 years old, his father, Col. Lance Myler, came home from drill and hung his oath of office on the wall, signed by Charles M. Keifner, the former adjutant general of the Missouri National Guard.

Twenty-seven years later, Frederick's father promoted him to staff sergeant at Ike Skelton Training Site.

"As a Guardsman myself, watching Dustin take the next step for a noncommissioned officer is a proud day for me and the rest of our family as well," Myler said.

Myler enlisted into active service as an Army military policeman in 1983. He commissioned into the Missouri National Guard as an aviation officer in 1987 through Reserve Officer Training Corps and now serves in the Individual Ready Reserve from his hometown of Lebanon.

"My dad's service really inspired me growing up," Frederick said. "I always wanted to join the Guard. He went on his first deployment when I was 20, and three years later I enlisted."

Frederick is not the only member of his family continuing the Guard legacy. His sister-in-law, Pvt. Sam Hooper, is slated leave for Basic Combat Training this summer, and his younger brother, Brandon Myler, is currently in the enlistment process

Since Frederick's enlistment he has held four military occupational specialties, including information technology, maintenance, admin, and now medical

logistics with the Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 229th Multifunctional Medical Battalion in Jefferson City.

Sgt. 1st Class Daniel Hopkins, the 229th's Readiness noncommissioned officer, said this is Frederick's second promotion since he joined the unit.

"Frederick came to me as a specialist three years ago and really hit the ground running," Hopkins said. "I'm sure he'll be looking for many new opportunities to grow and succeed in the future in the wore his Korean War vet-Guard."

To Frederick and Myler, work doesn't feel like work when family is around. Myler gave his son's unit incentive rides in his Black Hawk during Frederick's 2011 and 2012 annual training.

"It was a great time to get to meet his unit and his leadership and kind of see what the Guard world looks like to him,"

Myler said. "It's exciting to see our legacy as a family become part of the Guard legacy. I mean, all you have to do is step in the front door of ISTS and you'll see photos and exhibits that show what we're a part of."

Frederick's battalion commander, Lt. Col Rebecca Segovia arranged for his father to promote him, like her father promoted her at every ceremony from staff sergeant to lieutenant colonel.

"I remember my father erans hat to the ceremony with all of his ribbons," Segovia said. "He pinned my rank on and saluted me with a tear in his eye. It was also my deployment ceremony to Kosovo."

Six months into Segovia's deployment, her father passed away.

Like Frederick, Segovia's family also carries on a legacy of military service. Her father, his five brothers, and six of her mother's siblings all served in different branches of the military. Segovia passed the tradition on to her son, niece, and nephew who all serve in the National Guard with her.

Segovia, Frederick, and Myler cherish the opportunities they get to work with their families, and the occasions they celebrate much more. Like Myler, she makes time to mark her family's military milestones. She plans to attend her niece's upcoming basic combat training graduation.

"As military legacies, we have grown up with values that mirror the Army values," Segovia said. "When you really live and understand sacrifice firsthand, your reality changes, and you treasure the moments you have."
