MEP EXPANDS UP NORTH

Company already has added jobs for new fiberglass parts line

The head of Marine Electrical Products said the market made expansion of his company viable and help from the state and the local Enhance Enterprise Zone was the "icing on the cake."

MEP unveiled its new manufacturing facility, dubbed the MEP North Campus, during a ribbon-cutting ceremony Thursday morning. The North Missouri 5 facility is expected to create 15 jobs within the next five years. The 26,000 square feet building will house MEP's new fiberglass fabrication department, giving the company room to expand its offerings and build up inventory, according to MEP President Brian Barbo.

The expansion was made possible in part because it is an Enhanced Enterprise Zone project. If MEP follows certain requirements, such as committing at least \$100,00 in new investment and creating at least two new jobs, the company will qualify for a 50 percent tax abatement on any improvements done to the property. The company also will be eligible for up to \$45,000 worth of tax credits from the state over the next five years.

"I think that an operation has to be financially viable regardless of those things, but that's the icing on the cake that adds all the flavor to it and definitely removes all doubt. It gave us the impetus to jump in right now while we still only have a small amount of production.

City peers forward to CIP

Capital improvements priorities are critical as FY2014 budgeting begins, says Heard

Members of the Lebanon City Council began digging into the city's 2014 budget Thursday with a threehour meeting addressing proposed capital improvements.

Lebanon City Administrator Chris Heard reminded council members that the 200-plus page Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is simply a part of the planning phase for the next five years. None of the items presented are a part of the city's budget at this time.

No details about funding specific projects were discussed.

Presentations for FY14, and beyond, were made for proposed purchases and projects for the city's police and fire departments, buildings and grounds (which includes the Kenneth E. Cowan Civic Center, the Mills Center, the Nelson Education Center and other city-owned facilities), administration and street departments. Other departments' capital improvement needs will be addressed Monday following the regular city council meeting.

Among the items highlighted at the meeting were equipment needs

Thursday, including vehicles for the police, fire, and buildings and grounds departments, sound equipment for the CCC theater, safety the newly elected officials and the example of neglect is the 15-year-old equipment for police and firefighters, and software improvements.

"The city has gone through a transition over the last couple of years, including hiring me in the last two years, and a lot of folks had the improvements on their mind," Heard told The Daily Record today. "They will say, "This has been talked

about for a long time.' I said that we

for each department addressed need to put this into a formal document called a Capital Improvement Program, which is pretty common in most cities, and just articulate to community as a whole, the priorities as a whole.'

Heard continued by stating that the items and projects presented in the CIP have been identified as those that need to be looked at over the next five years. It also gave council the opportunity to hear for themselves some of the items that have been overlooked for a number

"The thing that I have noticed since I have been here is that expenses kind of pop up," Heard said. "They haven't really popped up. The need and knowing that the need is there has been around, it just hasn't been communicated. When you look at bulletproof vests and cars, in 2010 we started a replacement on our cars and that was a massive, large, hundreds of thousands of dollars expenditure. We have just ran things into the ground. Really, to be prudent, you have to have a life-cycle and a replacement program. This Capital Improvement Program will show that every year, we are going to need \$90,000 to replace vehicles so that we are constantly keeping the stock we need to keep.

One area Heard said was a perfect Civic Center.

"One thing Deryl (Wilson, the director of operations for the facility) said constantly was '15 years,"' Heard said. "If you really think about it, the Civic Center hasn't had any improvements to it since it was built. So, it is time to start looking at that.

Woman charged after allegedly hitting a deputy

An intoxicated Lebanon woman faces an assault charge for allegedly trying to attack two Laclede County deputies while they were detaining her.

Jessica Ann Poole, 30, is charged with a class A misdemeanor of assault on a law enforcement officer in the third degree. Poole was issued a summons and released from the Laclede County Jail. Her initial arraignment is scheduled for June 24, according to online court records.

At about 8:39 p.m. Tuesday, a Laclede County Sheriff's Office deputy was dispatched to the area of Peach Drive for a report of a domestic disturbance on the roadside that involved two women and a man. The deputy found Poole, who matched the description of one of the women, walking along the middle of the road. The deputy reported that she had a "strong odor" of intoxicants coming from her person.

Poole claimed that she was just out in the road to walk her dog. She later said she had been at a house with her boyfriend and his mother and had gotten into an argument with her boyfriend. The deputy told Poole that he would have to detain her until he spoke with the other parties and placed her in his patrol car, according to a probable cause statement released by the Laclede County Prosecuting Attorney's office.

Nice Saturday, rainy Sunday

NWS expects warm-up soon

What has so far been a fairly mild summer will continue through the weekend before warming up somewhat next week.

According to National Weather Service meteorologist Steve Lindenberg, Saturday will be sunny and dry with a highs in the low 80s and lows in the 50s or 60s. After that an upper level

disturbance coming from the northern part of the Rocky Mountains will bring with it a fairly certain chance of rain Sunday. The rain, which could be a quarter to half an inch for the area, is expected to take place mainly in the morning



but could linger through the afternoon.

As with Saturday, Sunday's highs are expected to be in the low 80s with lows in the 50s or 60s. The rain should stop before Monday, when the area can expect to see the beginning of a gradual warm-up that will continue through the next few days.

"After Sunday it looks for the most part fairly dry with temperatures rising back into the mid to upper 80s, so more of a summertime pattern," Lindenberg said.

St. Louis gets big game from Miller

Rookie pitcher comes through at the plate, on the mound in win over Arizona

ST. LOUIS — Shelby Miller gave himself a boost with his bat.

The rookie pitcher hit his first career home run and pitched six sharp innings, leading the St. Louis Cardinals over the Arizona Diamondbacks 12-8 Thursday night.

"I haven't hit a home run since high school, at least in a game," said Miller, whose 1.91 earned run average continues to lead the National League. "It was neat. It will be something I remember for sure. Sometimes you get lucky."

Miller (7-3) allowed two runs and six hits. He struck out nine and walked none.

Arizona scored three times in the ninth, and Edward Mujica got the last two outs for his 18th save in 18 chances.

Matt Adams and Daniel Descalso homered in an eight-run fourth inning off Ian Kennedy. Matt Holliday and Matt Carpenter also connected for the Cardinals.

Kennedy (3-4) was tagged for 10 runs and 13 hits in four innings.

Kennedy nearly escaped the fourth with giving up just one run, but his throw off on Yadier Molina's comebacker pulled shortstop Didi Gregorius wide of second base. What could have been an inning-ending double play instead led to Adams' three-run homer and Descalso's tworun shot.

"I think we've made that play and we expect to make that play," Arizona manager Kirk Gibson said. "It didn't happen today and it cost us."

Kennedy endured the entire inning and threw 50 pitches. He had 99 total, only 60 for strikes.

He said typically he'll ask his middle infielders which one will cover the bag in a situation like that before he makes a pitch. He failed to do so and when he saw second baseman Cliff Pennington break toward the bag his instinct was to throw it to him until

Gregorius took charge. By then, Kennedy double clutched

and threw wide. "That whole sequence. It was perfect," he said. "I was trying to get a double play in that situation. It would have been a lot different if I was able to turn. That's just my fault. I should have known who covered the bag just before that pitch."

The Cardinals hit five homers in a

game for the first time since last July 27. The previous time they did it at home was June 24, 2005, at the former Busch Stadium.

David Freese extended his careerbest hitting streak to 16 games for St. Louis. Descalso scored twice in the big fourth and finished with three hits, including a double.

The first five batters in the St. Louis starting lineup all got two hits, as did

Royals rally for 7-3 victory over Twins

KANSAS CITY — It started with a double by Alex Gordon, gained momentum on a single by Eric Hosmer and another double by Billy Butler, and then was capped off by a two-run shot from Lorenzo Cain.

It was a four-run eighth inning by the Kansas City Royals.

It was the kind of outburst that hasn't happened often.

In this case, it carried the Royals to a 7-3 victory over the Minnesota Twins on Thursday night and to back-to-back wins for the first time since May 4-5. But the big inning also represented as many runs as the scuffling Kansas City offense had produced in any of its last

"We're getting better. We're starting to come out of it," Royals manager Ned Yost said. "The offense looks like it's starting to turn the corner a little bit."

The Royals began the season 17-10 before winning six of their next 28 games, their collapse lowlighted by a franchise-record 11-game home skid that ended Wednesday night.

Now they're on a winning streak, modest though it may be.

"We've always felt confidence. We had a bad May. That's all I can say," Butler said. "We had a bad May, but our confidence has never been wavering. You saw it tonight. We got down 3-0 and battled back and kind of exploded there in the eighth."

The Royals hadn't scored seven runs in a game since beating the Astros on

Parables are naturally limited in what they teach. Often many lessons can be drawn from them, but we must take care to discern if we are learning something from the parable, or if the parable merely causes us to think about something that could be called a lesson. So, do riches blind us? A writer once wrote how generous he was in tipping cab drivers--until he began to acquire wealth. Wealth doesn't so much blind us as it causes us to look away.

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

On June 7, 1776, Richard Henry Lee of Virginia proposed to the Continental Congress a resolution stating "That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States, that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British

In 1654, King Louis XIV, age 15, was crowned in Rheims, 11 years after the start of his reign.

In 1769, frontiersman Daniel Boone first began to explore present-day Kentucky.

In 1862, William Bruce Mumford, a Confederate loyalist, was hanged at the order of Union military authorities for tearing down a U.S. flag that had been flying over the New Orleans mint shortly before the city was occupied by the North.

In 1863, French forces oc-Franco-Mexican War.

ST. LOUIS — The National Weather Service says storms that last week ravaged the St. Louis area and portions of neighboring Illinois spawned nine tornadoes, amazingly not causing any serious inju-

KMOV-TV reports some of the worst destruction resulted from an EF3 twister that hit parts of Missouri's St. Charles and St. Louis counties before clipping St. Louis city.

That tornado was said to be 1,000 yards wide and had winds of 136 to 165 mph. Eight people sustained minor injuries, and more than six dozen homes were rendered uninhabitable.

A tornado of similar size tore through a landfill in Roxana, Ill., northeast of St. Louis.

Two smaller twisters were reported in Illinois' Macoupin County, as well as in Missouri's Franklin and Jefferson counties.

Gov. Nixon to survey flooding in West Alton

WEST ALTON - Missouri Gov. Jay Nixon plans to survey flooding along the Mississippi River north of St. Louis.

Nixon was heading to St Charles County today for an aerial look at the high water and the condition of levees. He scheduled a meeting afterward in West Alton with local and county emergency man-

agers, law enforcement officers, County Executive Steve Ehlmann and officials of North County Consolidated Levee District.

Heavy rain last week caused a sudden rise in the Mississippi, Missouri and Illinois rivers and some smaller waterways in the region. A couple of levees failed in recent days in the area of West Alton, Mo., and Alton, Ill.

"The forecast is not great news for the Missouri River," Fuchs said, cautioning that whether the storms produce enough rains to again raise the rivers to concerning levels "is all dependent on how much rain there is and where it falls.'

"We'd be looking mostly at the potential of it keeping the river up higher and longer," extending the strain on barriers that so far have back the floodwaters with few consequential breaches, Fuchs said.

Shippers may have reason to rejoice. 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'We don't have to wait until the plant's full to make the investment," Barbo said after the event. During his presentation to the people gathered at the ribbon-cutting, Barbo added that the project may not have been possible without the help of Lebanon Regional Economic Development Inc. President Mark Stombaugh. He said that Stombaugh's assistance in "guiding him through the maze" of Missouri Department of Economic Development's assistance programs was "invaluable."

"Without the support of the Missouri DED through these programs, this expansion may have never come to fruition," Barbo said.

MEP has already made a \$750,000 investment in purchasing the building and equipment to make the fiberglass consoles for boats. MEP has moved a few employees and some equipment into the building and began production there in middle of May.

Lebanon Area Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Darrell Pollock said it's nice to see the MEP sign lit up at night on the side of a building that has been long vacant. Before MEP purchased the property, the building had been empty since 2011. The building was the former home of Sundancer Pontoons, which was relocated to South Carolina after the more-than-20-years-old Laclede County business was purchased by Encore Boat Builders LLC.

"I don't know how many of you drive up and down North 5, but isn't it great to see this corner once again producing?" Pollock said. Pollock also announced that MEP has joined the Chamber.

According to Barbo, it is hard to quantify how many jobs have been or will be created by the expansion into the new facility, but he said since the company started making the fiberglass consoles, the company has hired more than it had originally projected that the expansion would add to its payroll.

town when it comes to fiberglass consoles for boats, but Barbo said his company can offer something different to customers with the company's two facilities working together. Not only will MEP be able to provide customers with the fiberglass parts, they will also be able to give them the wiring to go along with the parts. Barbo said that MEP is in a unique position because the company can now be a "one-stop shop" for customers.

"All of these parts come with additional wire panels and the customers get other wiring products and vac-formed products to go along with, so we'll need that freed up space (at the main facility) for the corollary volume that goes along with this," he said. "This broadens us on all fronts."

The purchasing of the new facility isn't the first time MEP has invested in the community. In 2007, a brush fire destroyed some of MEP's buildings on Tower Road, but rather than move to another community, many of which were trying to lure MEP away, the company decided to rebuild here.

Both Stombaugh and Pollock commended the company for continuing to invest in the community.

"MEP is a highly successful local company. It has a great story. Brian (Barbo), you and your employees have experienced excellent growth, and you've also our country's most great reces-

MIAMI — After bringing rains, heavy winds and even tornadoes to parts of Florida, Tropical Storm Andrea moved quickly across south Georgia and was speeding through the Carolinas early today, promising sloppy commutes and waterlogged vacation getaways through the beginning of the weekend.

The first named storm of the Atlantic season lost some intensity late Thursday and by early Friday, its winds were down to 45 mph (75 kph).

Ben Nelson, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Jacksonville, said Andrea was "moving at a pretty brisk pace" and could lose its tropical characteristics as early as Friday morning.

Derrec Becker with the South Carolina Emergency Management Division said the storm was near Walterboro in the southern part of the state at 6 a.m. Friday, moving to the northeast.

The storm had been nothing more than a severe thunderstorm so far, Becker said. No injuries were reported and there had been no reports of significant damage. Becker said some trees have been blown over.

However, forecasters warned the storm could cause isolated flooding and storm surge over the next two days.

Heavy rains were continuing well away from the storm's center. The weather service in Charleston, S.C., advised of "an enhanced coastal flooding threat near the high tide Friday morning," as well as of possible tornadoes. Rain bands could bring wind gusts in excess of 40 mph or 50 mph, the weather service said.
