MEP EXPANDS UP NORTH

Company already has added jobs for new fiberglass parts line

The head of Marine Electrical Products said the market made expansion of his company viable and help from the state and the local Enhance Enterprise Zone was the "icing on the cake."

MEP unveiled its new manufacturing facility, dubbed the MEP North Campus, during a ribbon-cutting ceremony Thursday morning. The North Missouri 5 facility is expected to create 15 jobs within the next five years. The 26,000 square feet building will house MEP's new fiberglass fabrication department, giving the company room to expand its offerings and build up inventory, according to MEP President Brian Barbo.

The expansion was made possible in part because it is an Enhanced Enterprise Zone project. If MEP follows certain requirements, such as committing at least \$100,000 in new investment and creating at least two new jobs, the company will qualify for a 50 percent tax abatement on any improvements done to the property. The company also will be eligible for up to \$45,000 worth of tax credits from the state over the next five years.

"I think that an operation has to be financially viable regardless of those things, but that's the icing on the cake that adds all the flavor to it and definitely removes all doubt. It gave us the impetus to jump in right now while we still only have a small amount of production."

Woman charged after allegedly hitting a deputy

An intoxicated Lebanon woman faces an assault charge for allegedly trying to attack two Laclede County deputies while they were detaining her.

Jessica Ann Poole, 30, is charged with a class A misdemeanor of assault on a law enforcement officer in the third degree. Poole was issued a summons and released from the Laclede County Jail. Her initial arraignment is scheduled for June 24, according to online court records.

At about 8:39 p.m. Tuesday, a Laclede County Sheriff's Office deputy was dispatched to the area of Peach Drive for a report of a domestic disturbance on the roadside that involved two women and a man. The deputy found Poole, who matched the description of one of the women, walking along the middle of the road. The deputy reported that she had a "strong odor" of intoxicants coming from her person.

Poole claimed that she was just out in the road to walk her dog. She later said she had been at a house with her boyfriend and his mother and had gotten into an argument with her boyfriend. The deputy told Poole that he would have to detain her until he spoke with the other parties and placed her in his patrol car, according to a probable cause statement released by the Laclede County Prosecuting Attorney's office.

Nice Saturday, rainy Sunday

NWS expects warm-up soon

What has so far been a fairly mild summer will continue through the weekend before warming up somewhat next week.

According to National Weather Service meteorologist Steve Lindenberg, Saturday will be sunny and dry with a highs in the low 80s and lows in the 50s or 60s. After that an upper level disturbance coming from the northern part of the Rocky Mountains will bring with it a fairly certain chance of rain Sunday. The rain, which could be a quarter to half an inch for the area, is expected to take place mainly in the morning but could linger through the afternoon.



As with Saturday, Sunday's highs are expected to be in the low 80s with lows in the 50s or 60s. The rain should stop before Monday, when the area can expect to see the beginning of a gradual warm-up that will continue through the next few days.

"After Sunday it looks for the most part fairly dry with temperatures rising back into the mid to upper 80s, so more of a summertime pattern," Lindenberg said.

City peers forward to CIP

Capital improvements priorities are critical as FY2014 budgeting begins, says Heard

Members of the Lebanon City Council began digging into the city's 2014 budget Thursday with a three-hour meeting addressing proposed capital improvements.

Lebanon City Administrator Chris Heard reminded council members that the 200-plus page Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is simply a part of the planning phase for the next five years. None of the items presented are a part of the city's budget at this time.

No details about funding specific projects were discussed.

Presentations for FY14, and beyond, were made for proposed purchases and projects for the city's police and fire departments, buildings and grounds (which includes the Kenneth E. Cowan Civic Center, the Mills Center, the Nelson Education Center and other city-owned facilities), administration and street departments. Other departments' capital improvement needs will be addressed Monday following the regular city council meeting.

Among the items highlighted at the meeting were equipment needs

for each department addressed Thursday, including vehicles for the police, fire, and buildings and grounds departments, sound equipment for the CCC theater, safety equipment for police and firefighters, and software improvements.

"The city has gone through a transition over the last couple of years, including hiring me in the last two years, and a lot of folks had the improvements on their mind," Heard told The Daily Record today. "They will say, 'This has been talked about for a long time.' I said that we

need to put this into a formal document called a Capital Improvement Program, which is pretty common in most cities, and just articulate to the newly elected officials and the community as a whole, the priorities as a whole."

Heard continued by stating that the items and projects presented in the CIP have been identified as those that need to be looked at over the next five years. It also gave council the opportunity to hear for themselves some of the items that have been overlooked for a number

of years.

"The thing that I have noticed since I have been here is that expenses kind of pop up," Heard said. "They haven't really popped up. The need and knowing that the need is there has been around, it just hasn't been communicated. When you look at bulletproof vests and cars, in 2010 we started a replacement on our cars and that was a massive, large, hundreds of thousands of dollars expenditure. We have just ran things into the ground. Really, to be prudent, you have to have a life-cycle and a replacement program. This Capital Improvement Program will show that every year, we are going to need \$90,000 to replace vehicles so that we are constantly keeping the stock we need to keep."

One area Heard said was a perfect example of neglect is the 15-year-old Civic Center.

"One thing Deryl (Wilson, the director of operations for the facility) said constantly was '15 years,'" Heard said. "If you really think about it, the Civic Center hasn't had any improvements to it since it was built. So, it is time to start looking at that."

NASCAR brings Missouri Sunday showdown

Lebanon's I-44 Speedway to host NASCAR's K&N Pro Series West in nationally televised event

When NASCAR became the official sanctioning body of I-44 Speedway this offseason, track officials had hopes of attracting big name talent and perhaps a high-powered touring series or two.

Just six weeks into the inaugural campaign as a NASCAR home track, Missouri's only asphalt oval will play host to its second star-studded traveling series as the NASCAR K&N Pro Series West comes calling this weekend for a nationally-televised Sunday night special, the Reliable Toyota/G-Oil 150, with a strong contingent of veterans and rising stars.

"Having that NASCAR name directly associated with your track has many benefits, and this is one of them," Lebanon I-44 Speedway general manager Kevin Greven said. "We're able to attract these touring series like the K&Ns and JEGS/CRA All Stars, and consequently bring reputable and well-known talent to the track for the fans to see. Several of these drivers competing in Sunday night's event will make it to the big leagues of NASCAR."

K&N Pro Series points leader Derek Thorn leads a talented ensemble of drivers looking to grab the first trophy for the series at I-44 Speedway. Fans can look

forward to seeing several rising stars including young gun Cameron Hayley and veteran hotshoe Greg Pursley, as the tour runs a 150-lap main event with a mandatory caution at lap 75 to allow teams the opportunity to make changes to their machines.

Two NASCAR Whelen All-American Series weekly divisions will kick off the action as the O'Reilly Auto Parts NASCAR Pro Late Models and Budweiser NASCAR Modifieds round out the night. Gates will open at a special 4 p.m. time with qualifying for the K&N Pro Series West getting underway at 5 p.m.

Fans can look forward to seeing the first green flag wave at 6

p.m. sharp. Advance tickets are still available by visiting www.i44speedway.net.

"This is going to be a great chance to see rising stars and enjoy two late model features," Greven said. "A number of our drivers will be paying close attention because they want to make the jump to a tour like this in the coming years."

St. Louis gets big game from Miller

Rookie pitcher comes through at the plate, on the mound in win over Arizona

ST. LOUIS — Shelby Miller gave himself a boost with his bat.

The rookie pitcher hit his first career home run and pitched six sharp innings, leading the St. Louis Cardinals over the Arizona Diamondbacks 12-8 Thursday night.

"I haven't hit a home run since high school, at least in a game," said Miller, whose 1.91 earned run average continues to lead the National League. "It was neat. It will be something I remember for sure. Sometimes you get lucky."

Miller (7-3) allowed two runs and six hits. He struck out nine and walked none.

Arizona scored three times in the ninth, and Edward Mujica got the last two outs for his 18th save in 18

chances.

Matt Adams and Daniel Descalso homered in an eight-run fourth inning off Ian Kennedy. Matt Holliday and Matt Carpenter also connected for the Cardinals.

Kennedy (3-4) was tagged for 10 runs and 13 hits in four innings.

Kennedy nearly escaped the fourth with giving up just one run, but his throw off on Yadier Molina's comebacker pulled shortstop Didi Gregorius wide of second base. What could have been an inning-ending double play instead led to Adams' three-run homer and Descalso's two-run shot.

"I think we've made that play and we expect to make that play," Arizona manager Kirk Gibson said. "It didn't happen today and it cost us."

Kennedy endured the entire inning and threw 50 pitches. He had 99 total, only 60 for strikes.

He said typically he'll ask his middle infielders which one will cover the bag in a situation like that before he makes a pitch. He failed to do so and when he saw second baseman Cliff Pennington break toward the bag his instinct was to throw it to him until Gregorius took charge.

By then, Kennedy double clutched and threw wide.

"That whole sequence. It was perfect," he said. "I was trying to get a double play in that situation. It would have been a lot different if I was able to turn. That's just my fault. I should have known who covered the bag just before that pitch."

The Cardinals hit five homers in a

game for the first time since last July 27. The previous time they did it at home was June 24, 2005, at the former Busch Stadium.

David Freese extended his career-best hitting streak to 16 games for St. Louis. Descalso scored twice in the big fourth and finished with three hits, including a double.

The first five batters in the St. Louis starting lineup all got two hits, as did Miller.

■ **Notes:** The Cardinals have gone 9-0-3 in their past 12 series. Goldschmidt has an RBI in six consecutive games. Carpenter extended his career-best hitting streak to 15 games. Allen Craig has a 10-game streak. Miller was 2 for 25 in his career at the plate entering the game. He singled in the second for his first hit of the season.

KANSAS CITY ROYALS

Royals rally for 7-3 victory over Twins

KANSAS CITY — It started with a double by Alex Gordon, gained momentum on a single by Eric Hosmer and another double by Billy Butler, and then was capped off by a two-run shot from Lorenzo Cain.

It was a four-run eighth inning by the Kansas City Royals.

It was the kind of outburst that hasn't happened often.

In this case, it carried the Royals to a 7-3 victory over the Minnesota Twins on Thursday night and to back-to-back wins for the first time since May 4-5. But the big inning also represented as many runs as the scuffling Kansas City offense had produced in any of its last 14 games.

"We're getting better. We're starting to come out of it," Royals manager Ned Yost said. "The offense looks like it's starting to turn the corner a little bit."

The Royals began the season 17-10 before winning six of their next 28 games, their collapse lowlighted by a franchise-record 11-game home skid that ended Wednesday night.

Now they're on a winning streak, modest though it may be.

"We've always felt confidence. We had a bad May. That's all I can say," Butler said. "We had a bad May, but our confidence has never been wavering. You saw it tonight. We got down 3-0 and battled back and kind of exploded there in the eighth."

The Royals hadn't scored seven runs in a game since beating the Astros on May 21.

■ **NOTES:** The Royals claimed 3B/OF Edinson Rincon off waivers from San Diego and optioned him to Double-A Northwest Arkansas. They also sent OF Jarrod Dyson (right ankle sprain) on a rehab trip to Triple-A Omaha. The Twins head to Washington for the first time under manager Ron Gardenhire, though he pointed out he's been there before. He visited the White House after the '91 Twins won the World Series.



TODAY IN HISTORY

Today is Friday, June 7, the 158th day of 2013. There are 207 days left in the year.

On June 7, 1776, Richard Henry Lee of Virginia proposed to the Continental Congress a resolution stating "That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States, that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown."

In 1654, King Louis XIV, age 15, was crowned in Rheims, 11 years after the start of his reign.

In 1769, frontiersman Daniel Boone first began to explore present-day Kentucky.

In 1862, William Bruce Mumford, a Confederate loyalist, was hanged at the order of Union military authorities for tearing down a U.S. flag that had been flying over the New Orleans mint shortly before the city was occupied by the North.

In 1863, French forces occupied Mexico City during the Franco-Mexican War.

In 1892, Homer Plessy, a "Creole of color," was fined for refusing to leave a whites-only car of the East Louisiana Railroad. (Ruling on his case, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld "separate but equal" racial segregation, which it overturned in 1954.)

In 1929, the sovereign state of Vatican City came into existence as copies of the Lateran Treaty were exchanged in Rome.

In 1942, the World War II Battle of Midway ended in a decisive victory for American forces over the Imperial Japanese.

In 1967, the Haight Ashbury Free Medical Clinic opened in San Francisco.

In 1972, the musical "Grease" opened on Broadway, having already been performed in lower Manhattan.

In 1981, Israeli military planes destroyed a nuclear power plant in Iraq, a facility

the Israelis charged could have been used to make nuclear weapons.

In 1993, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that religious groups can sometimes meet on school property after hours.

In 1998, in a crime that shocked the nation, James Byrd Jr., a 49-year-old black man, was hooked by a chain to a pickup truck and dragged to his death in Jasper, Texas. (Two white men were later sentenced to death for the crime; a third received life with the possibility of parole.)

Ten years ago: In a national first, New Hampshire Episcopalians elected the Rev. V. Gene Robinson, an openly gay man, their next bishop.

A suicide bomber in Afghanistan killed four German peacekeepers; the blast also killed a teenage Afghan bystander. Justine Henin-Hardenne beat Kim Clijsters 6-0, 6-4 at the French Open, in the first all-Belgian Grand Slam final. Empire Maker beat Kentucky Derby-Preakness winner Funny Cide in the Belmont Stakes.

Five years ago: Hillary Rodham Clinton suspended her pioneering campaign for the presidency and endorsed fellow Democrat Barack Obama. Longshot Da' Tara spoiled Big Brown's bid for a Triple Crown by winning the Belmont Stakes. Ana Ivanovic won her first Grand Slam title by beating Dinara Safina 6-4, 6-3 in the French Open. Veteran sportscaster Jim McKay died in Monkton, Md., at age 86.

One year ago: Attorney General Eric Holder clashed with Republicans on the House Judiciary Committee seeking more information about a flawed gun-trafficking investigation in Arizona known as "Operation Fast and Furious." Bob Welch, a former member of Fleetwood Mac who went on to write songs and record several hits during a solo career, died in Nashville; he was 65.

Mississippi River crests in Midwest

ST. LOUIS — The rain-swollen Mississippi River on Thursday slowly receded along earthen levees and sandbags that have thus far held up, but storms expected to blow through the nation's midsection could keep water levels stubbornly high for a while.

The National Weather Service said the river had crested in the St. Louis area and the Illinois towns of Grafton and Alton further north. But there was no such luck in southeast Missouri's Cape Girardeau and Dutchtown, where the river's levels weren't expected to peak until sometime Friday.

Rain that may fall over the next week in an area stretching from Nebraska and Iowa to the Great Lakes could fur-

ther swell the Mississippi and the Missouri River, which feeds into it, hydrologist Mark Fuchs said from the weather service's St. Louis-area office.

"The forecast is not great news for the Missouri River," Fuchs said, cautioning that whether the storms produce enough rains to again raise the rivers to concerning levels "is all dependent on how much rain there is and where it falls."

"We'd be looking mostly at the potential of it keeping the river up higher and longer," extending the strain on barriers that so far have back the floodwaters with few consequential breaches, Fuchs said.

Crests of the Mississippi at many points along it have widely been among the top 10 on record, although they

fell well short of the heights reached during the disastrous Great Flood of 1993.

Shippers may have reason to rejoice. A Coast Guard spokesman said Thursday that part or even all of a roughly 250-mile stretch of the Mississippi that's been closed for days to barge traffic because the river's rise made currents and drifting debris unsafe for navigation could reopen, perhaps as early as Friday.

That closure has commercial implications: Grain shipments north of St. Louis haven't been able to get to the Gulf Coast for export, and everything from fertilizer to construction materials couldn't be sent upriver past St. Louis. The closure also has cut off barge access to the Illinois River, a gateway to the Great Lakes.

Meteorologists: 9 twisters part of Mo., Ill. storm

ST. LOUIS — The National Weather Service says storms that last week ravaged the St. Louis area and portions of neighboring Illinois spawned nine tornadoes, amazingly not causing any serious injuries.

KMOV-TV reports some of the worst destruction resulted from an EF3 twister that hit parts of Missouri's St. Charles and St. Louis counties before clipping St. Louis city.

That tornado was said to be 1,000 yards wide and had winds of 136 to 165 mph. Eight people sustained minor injuries, and more than six dozen homes were rendered uninhabitable.

A tornado of similar size tore through a landfill in Roxana, Ill., northeast of St. Louis.

Two smaller twisters were reported in Illinois' Macoupin County, as well as in Missouri's Franklin and Jefferson counties.

Three other tornadoes hit Missouri's Montgomery County.

Gov. Nixon to survey flooding in West Alton

WEST ALTON — Missouri Gov. Jay Nixon plans to survey flooding along the Mississippi River north of St. Louis.

Nixon was heading to St. Charles County today for an aerial look at the high water and the condition of levees. He scheduled a meeting afterward in West Alton with local and county emergency man-

agers, law enforcement officers, County Executive Steve Ehlmann and officials of North County Consolidated Levee District.

Heavy rain last week caused a sudden rise in the Mississippi, Missouri and Illinois rivers and some smaller waterways in the region. A couple of levees failed in recent days in the area of West Alton, Mo., and Alton, Ill.

"As a community, we need to decide if it is something we should reinvest in."

The city administrator emphasized that the CIP was not staff recommendations for the 2014 budget.

"It is simply identifying a need of assets that we use and maintain on a daily basis," he said.

Biggest needs

While the CIP is just a plan, Heard explained that there are some areas that will need more attention than others in the future, including street maintenance, improvements to the city's wastewater system, water and electric technology upgrades, and the Civic Center.

"In my mind those are the four main items that will merit the most discussion," he said.

Streets

Heard said the city has long allowed streets to deteriorate to the point that they must be rebuilt.

"We need to change to conversation from rebuilding

streets to maintaining streets," he said. "A lot of our streets have been reconstructed over the years, but we need to maintain what we have to the highest level. We can't let them crumble to nothing and then just rebuild them. We need to maintain them along the way."

Wastewater treatment

"I think in the next five years, we are going to be looking at some major improvements at our wastewater treatment facility," Heard said. "I think that will garner a lot of discussion. A lot of people don't even know where it is at or what it does. It moves millions of gallons of water a day, and it is almost at capacity. We will also need some improvements on our collection system."

Water and Electric

"We would like to move to an integrated technology with an AMI system, which is an automatic meter reading system that will allow us some efficiencies and allow the customers to continue to

make the decisions they are making as far as it relates to energy conservation."

Cowen Civic Center

Heard said the main question regarding the Civic Center is how much to invest in the facility.

"It's time," he said. "It's been 15 years, and 15 years will wear a building down really quick. I think it is time to invest some funds in that, and to quote the mayor (Lyle Anderson), it is the jewel of our city. I think it is something we should be proud of."

He went on to explain that he understands the concerns about the facility not being a "money maker," but it is a tremendous asset to the city.

"I think it does well on its own," Heard said. "In terms of it's recapture, I think it does pretty good. We just haven't maintained it like we should. ... Hopefully, once we make some of these investments, we can get on a maintenance program."

While capital improvements may appear to be "wish

lists," Heard said there is no way a municipality can get around them, but they can be planned for.

"When you look at a capital improvement program, you look at it in a five-year swath," he said. "We will put some in the (2014) budget, then when we look at the 2015 capital improvement program, we will either say OK, or we will push it back and it will go to the FY16 budget. At that same time, we will pull up FY19 and start planning that year's capital improvements. You will always have a road that you are looking at."

"It also gives staff direction. If we are looking something in FY2017 and there's a three-year lead time to get to that point, we can start working toward that. If we do it in 2017 or not, we can start looking in that direction. ... You have to put it on the radar because if you come to council and say you need to initiate a design firm to help design a wastewater treatment plant, it's not a surprise."

How is FY2014 looking?

Heard said he does not expect any major fluctuations in the 2014 budget, calling it "pretty flat."

"We are going to probably decrease our electric revenue and our sales tax will probably hold flat," he said. "Our total connection on property tax looks like it is up, so I might increase that a little. Expense will hold flat."

"My biggest focus is going to be getting a good street program so that we can stretch those dollars and let people see that we are going to into maintenance mode, and also start spending some of those Fund 22 dollars to reinvest into the assets of the community."

What is Fund 22?

Fund 22 consists of funds generated by a voter-approved 1/2-cent sales tax that went into effect in 2009.

"It's for any capital improvement, but specifically they have talked about parks, the Civic Center and public safety," Heard said. "That is where I

intend to recommend investing that."

The tax generates about \$1.5 million annually and will sunset in 2019.

"Obviously, any time we go to voters and ask for their funds, they need to know that we are spending it were they want it spent," Heard said.

Questions?

Heard encouraged the public to talk to their elected officials about improvements they would like to see in the 2014 budget. People may also contact him or other department heads with questions or concerns. He added that the final draft of the CIP plan will be posted on the city's website early next week.

"The document is a communication tool for the public," he said. "Your municipal government is for the citizens, and we need as many tools available for them to read and engage and enquire. This is another one of those tools. It's a 220-page read, but it does, we feel, articulate our needs over the next five years."

and passwords updated in the new system so that the same user name and password will work," Van Hooser said.

Current subscribers also will get the e-Edition free for the two week trial period, she said. The extra time will be added to the end of their subscription periods.

Van Hooser said the change was made because the former e-Edition was not as accessible

for portable devices such as smart phones and tablets. "This one is more accessible to the Android-based devices, and it is more mobile. It works on i-Pads, i-Phones, Kindle Fire, Impression ... Of the several different brands of smart phones we have tried here in the office, we have yet to find one that it doesn't work on."

Another feature that is improved is the links embedded

in the e-Edition, she said. The "jump line" at the bottom of articles that continue to another page is clickable so that the rest of the article can be viewed immediately. More of the links in articles and advertisements also are clickable.

A subscription to the e-Edition costs \$78 for a year, which is a significant savings for those who receive their newspapers through the mail

outside the county or state. "If you're subscribing to the paper and have it mailed to you, the e-Edition will save you about \$70 a year for people in Missouri, and over \$100 a year for people outside Missouri," she said.

"We don't have to wait until the plant's full to make the investment," Barbo said after the event. During his presentation to the people gathered at the ribbon-cutting, Barbo added that the project may not have been possible without the help of Lebanon Regional Economic Development Inc. President Mark Stombaugh. He said that Stombaugh's assistance in "guiding him through the maze" of Missouri Department of Economic Development's assistance programs was "invaluable."

"Without the support of the Missouri DED through these programs, this expansion may have never come to fruition," Barbo said.

MEP has already made a \$750,000 investment in purchasing the building and equipment to make the fiberglass consoles for boats. MEP has moved a few employees and some equipment into the building and began production there in middle of May.

Lebanon Area Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Darrell Pollock said it's nice to see the MEP sign lit up at night on the side of a building that has been long vacant. Before MEP purchased the property, the building had been empty since 2011. The building was the former home of Sundancer Pontoons, which was relocated to South Carolina after the more-than-20-years-old Laclede County business was purchased by Encore Boat Builders LLC.

"I don't know how many of you drive up and down North 5, but isn't it great to see this corner once again producing?" Pollock said. Pollock also announced that MEP has joined the Chamber.

According to Barbo, it is hard to quantify how many jobs have been or will be created by the expansion into the new facility, but he said since the company started making the fiberglass consoles, the company has hired more than it had originally projected that the expansion would add to its payroll.

"It's hard for me to clearly say, 'These four other people are here because of this' because it sort of blends together with our main campus, but, yes, we have already hired more than 15 people since we started this project," Barbo said. Nine new jobs alone

were added to keep up with the new fiberglass line already. Barbo expects to add "at least" another 15 jobs over the next five years.

MEP began making the special fiberglass consoles in May 2012 with a "very small beginning," but since then, the market has taken off.

"Once we had a product and we could show people what we can do, we got more people interested in having us make these," Barbo said. "Just this spring, we made a number of new molds — about 20 new parts that will be coming out in the 2014 model boats for our customers, so that volume hasn't really come out of this operation yet. But, the stage is set now where we can take it in stride."

MEP is not the only game in town when it comes to fiberglass consoles for boats, but Barbo said his company can offer something different to customers with the company's two facilities working together. Not only will MEP be able to provide customers with the fiberglass parts, they will also be able to give them the wiring to go along with the parts. Barbo said that MEP is in a unique position because the company can now be a "one-stop shop" for customers.

"All of these parts come with additional wire panels and the customers get other wiring products and vac-formed products to go along with, so we'll need that freed up space (at the main facility) for the corollary volume that goes along with this," he said. "This broadens us on all fronts."

The purchasing of the new facility isn't the first time MEP has invested in the community. In 2007, a brush fire destroyed some of MEP's buildings on Tower Road, but rather than move to another community, many of which were trying to lure MEP away, the company decided to rebuild here.

Both Stombaugh and Pollock commended the company for continuing to invest in the community.

"MEP is a highly successful local company. It has a great story. Brian (Barbo), you and your employees have experienced excellent growth, and you've also experienced headwinds during our country's most great recession," Pollock said.

State Rep. Diane Franklin, R-Camdenton, also commended Barbo. Franklin, who represents the 123rd District, presented Barbo with a special recognition for "distinguished economic development."

"This is a success story for everyone in the state of Missouri to hear about," Franklin said. She said that she planned to use MEP and Detroit Tool Metal Products, which also recently started an expansion project, to show her fellow legislators that it is important to fund economic development in Missouri.

Stombaugh called MEP an "integral part" of Lebanon's marine manufacturing industry. He added that the company has reached "new heights" since Barbo took his position in 2005. MEP currently serves G3 Boats, Landau Boats, Lowe Boats and Tracker Marine in Lebanon, but also has customers beyond the city and even state boundaries. Stombaugh said MEP sells parts to companies as far away as Minnesota and Wisconsin.

MEP employs more than 225 people and has a payroll in excess of \$5 million, he added.

"They are a significant contributor to this community," Stombaugh said.

The man said he didn't want to risk getting in trouble by getting in an argument with Poole, so he asked his mother to drop him off on the side of the road.

After he got out of the car and his mother drove off, Poole allegedly jumped out of the moving car to confront her boyfriend. She allegedly punched him in the stomach and chest. He got back in the car and he and his mother drove off, according to the statement.

The deputy went back to his patrol car to get statement forms for the man and woman to fill out, and Poole allegedly became combative again. She allegedly started slamming her head into the window again.

Another deputy opened the door to talk to Poole and she allegedly kicked him. The deputy stunned her with his taser, and then the two deputies put leg shackles on her, the statement said.

Poole was taken to the Laclede County Jail. The deputy reported that at the jail, Poole continued to be combative and tried to pull away from the deputy several times.

Neither the boyfriend or his mother wanted to press charges against Poole, the statement said.

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Tropical Storm Andrea zipping up the East Coast

No injuries were reported and there had been no reports of significant damage

MIAMI — After bringing rains, heavy winds and even tornadoes to parts of Florida, Tropical Storm Andrea moved quickly across south Georgia and was speeding through the Carolinas early today, promising sloppy commutes and waterlogged vacation getaways through the beginning of the weekend.

The first named storm of the Atlantic season lost some intensity late Thursday and by early Friday, its winds were down to 45 mph (75 kph).

Ben Nelson, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Jacksonville, said Andrea was "moving at a pretty brisk pace" and could lose its tropical characteristics as early as Friday morning.

Derrec Becker with the South Carolina Emergency Management Division said the storm was near Walterboro in the southern part of the state at 6 a.m. Friday, moving to the northeast.

The storm had been nothing more than a severe thunderstorm so far, Becker said. No injuries were reported and there had been no reports of significant damage. Becker said some trees have been blown over.

However, forecasters warned the storm could cause isolated flooding and storm surge over the next two days.

Heavy rains were continuing well away from the storm's center. The weather service in Charleston, S.C., advised of "an enhanced coastal flooding threat near the high tide Friday morning," as well as of possible tornadoes. Rain bands could bring wind gusts in excess of 40 mph or 50 mph, the weather service said.

Early today, tropical storm warnings remained in effect for the East Coast from Altamaha Sound in Georgia to Cape Charles Light in Virginia, the Pamlico and Albemarle sounds and the lower Chesapeake Bay south of New Point Comfort. A tropical storm warning means tropical storm conditions are expected somewhere inside the warning area within a day and a half.

Rains and winds from the

storm were forecast to sweep northward along the Southeastern U.S. coast Friday.

Florida Gov. Rick Scott had warned of the risk of tornadoes, and officials said that eight were confirmed across the state.

"This one fortunately is a fast-moving storm," he said Thursday. Slower-moving storms can pose a greater flood risk because they have more time to linger and dump rain.

In The Acreage, a part of Palm Beach County, Fla., pre-kindergarten teacher Maria Cristina Arias choked back tears and clutched valuable personal papers as she surveyed the damage done by a tornado to her five-bedroom home when she was away. Windows were smashed and a neighbor's shed had crashed into her bedroom.

"It's all destroyed," she told The Palm Beach Post. "This is unbelievable. I don't know what we're going to do."

Her 19-year-old son, Christian, was sleeping when he heard a loud noise.

"It was really scary," said the teen, who wasn't hurt. "It sounded like something exploded. I didn't know what was going on."

Meanwhile, south Georgia residents were bracing for high winds and heavy rains that could lead to flooding.

On Cumberland Island off the Georgia coast, the National Park Service was evacuating campers as the storm approached Thursday.

"My main concern is the winds," said chief park ranger Bridget Bohnet. "We're subject to trees falling and limbs breaking, and I don't want anybody getting hurt."

Forecasters were predicting the storm would pass through Georgia overnight, and the island would likely re-open to tourists today.

"It looks like it's picking up speed and that's a good thing because it won't sit and rain on us so long," said Jan Chamberlain, whose family runs the Blue Heron Inn Bed & Breakfast near the Sapelo Island Ferry station on Georgia's coast, on Thursday.

In the Carolinas, Andrea's biggest threat was heavy rain,

with as much as 6 inches expected, the weather service said.

Forecasters didn't expect major problems, however, along the coast such as the Outer Banks, a popular tourist destination.

John Elardo, a meteorologist with the weather service in Newport, N.C., said the storm would push major waves to the north and northeast, away from the

Outer Banks, where storms in the fall and winter wore away dunes and washed out portions of N.C. Highway 12, the only road connecting the barrier island to the mainland of North Carolina.

Andrea could bring up to a foot of flooding on the sound side of the Outer Banks, Elardo said.

The rain threatened to ruin a beach day for Angela Hursh,

41, of Cincinnati, who had rented a house in Frisco, N.C. Hursh was planning Friday to soak in the hot tub and watch movies with her 9-year-old and 13-year-old daughters.

"I think we're just going to hunker down and eat junk food," Hursh said Thursday.

Doug Brindley, who owns a vacation lodging rental service on the northern end of the

Outer Banks near Virginia, said Thursday he expects all outdoor activities to be washed out Friday, driving tens of thousands of early-summer vacationers toward unexpected shopping sprees.

"We're going to have rain and wind," said Brindley, who owns Brindley Beach Vacations and Sales. "Retailers are going to love it."
